MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR LAMP PARTICIPANTS, since I took office as State Treasurer and President of LAMP in January, 2000, our state has faced a number of financial challenges. Thankfully, LAMP is not one of those problems. In fact, LAMP represents an outstanding example of one of the solutions to our state's fiscal problems, in its existence as a cooperative endeavor among dedicated officials to pool local public funds for the benefit of their constituents.

Quite frankly, since taking office, I have found LAMP to be one of my most pleasant discoveries. I have long been aware of LAMP's existence, but until assuming the role of LAMP President, I had not realized just how successful LAMP is and how much promise this organization holds for both its participants and for Louisiana.

This is not to say that LAMP does not face its own set of challenges. This remarkable endeavor can only be as good as its participants. Since its inception, LAMP has been most fortunate to be blessed with a dedicated, selfless board of directors and a tireless, loyal and most efficient staff.

One of my foremost goals is to strengthen the structure of this organization to prepare it to achieve far greater size than the pool is today. The reason is simple: a larger pool benefits all participants through the economies of scale that allow the fund to generate higher rates of return and lower relative costs.

In order to accommodate the growth that LAMP promises, we have been carefully studying the findings made in the Mercer Report received last year. The Mercer Report analyzed every aspect of the organization and operation of LAMP, and made several important recommendations, some of which we have already implemented with the guidance of your board of directors.

Our first order of business was to reduce management fees by more than 10 percent. All of those savings flow directly into the pool to enhance LAMP's yield to its participants. This accomplishment was made possible only by the strong leadership of the board and the cooperation of LAMP's current investment advisor.

Secondly, we have contracted with BISYS Fund Services, Inc., to provide enhanced record-keeping and accounting administration, one of the Mercer Report's primary recommendations. The very need for attention to this area directly reflects LAMP's excellent record of growth over the last six years. I'm confident that this move will prepare LAMP to accommodate continued strong growth in the years to come.

We have also retained Louisiana-based independent professional marketing counsel to augment our efforts in telling the LAMP story across the state, another one of Mercer's major recommendations. Importantly, the hiring of LAMP'S own marketing firm will save additional expenses by eliminating the separate fee previously charged to the pool by

the investment manager for marketing services. I'm confident the results of this initiative will become quite visible as we move forward in marketing LAMP to a wider audience.

However, these steps are only the beginning. In order for LAMP to answer the challenges of the financial marketplace ahead and to reach its potential for the people of Louisiana, it is imperative that the Board of Directors and the staff examine every aspect of the organization. We must constantly seek ways to make LAMP more efficient, more responsive and more valuable to its participants than ever before. We must set our goals higher and extend our vision farther, but never forget our mission of safety of principal, daily liquidity and competitive yield.

To be successful in our mission to create the brightest possible future for LAMP, we will continue to rely on our board and staff for their customary excellent performance. However, I urge each individual participant in the pool to voice your thoughts and forward your suggestions for improvement to either my office or to any board member.

I plan to spend a great deal of my time soliciting your views as I travel around the state of Louisiana. I hope you share with me the conviction that LAMP is one of Louisiana's success stories, one that should be told to a wider audience.

I share your desire to shape LAMP into a permanent resource for the people of Louisiana. I pledge to you my unwavering commitment to finding ways to make LAMP more efficient, to reduce expenses wherever possible but to always maintain the high level of personal service that makes LAMP such a truly unique organization serving the citizens of Louisiana.

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT

LAMP CLOSED OUT THE MILLENNIUM (if you accept that 1999 was indeed the end of the millennium) with another year of impressive growth. However, although the customary numerical measurements continued to remain strong, 1999 represented a year of growth in more ways than usual.

To explain why, it is useful to look at the perspective of LAMP's history. At the end of 1999, LAMP's assets were nearly seven times as much as they had been at the end of 1994. The number of participants increased by nearly five times over the same period. However, LAMP's internal staffing levels and overhead have grown at a fraction of the rate of the pool itself. This could be possible only with a corresponding significant increase in productivity and dedication, which your LAMP staff has consistently demonstrated.

If LAMP is to continue the growth it has enjoyed over the last five years, yet still maintain the level of personal service our participants have rightfully come to expect, it is important that we continue our efforts to enhance productivity within the organization.

The Mercer Report essentially laid out a road map for LAMP that will guide the organization to grow to its potential in size without sacrificing the quality of service to participants. Most of the Mercer Report's recommendations addressed structural and organizational issues that require approval of the LAMP board. In fact, the board began implementing many of Mercer's primary recommendations during 1999, and we expect significant progress toward realization during 2000.

operation to the larger issues addressed by the Mercer Report. We also directed our attention to enhancing the internal productivity that has allowed LAMP to grow to such a greater size without a corresponding increase in overhead.


However, we did not limit our efforts in improving LAMP's

During 1999, we upgraded LAMP's in-house computer capabilities to handle the increased flow of information between the office and participants, investment managers and record-keeping services. In mid-2000, the LAMP board approved deployment of fully secure direct computer access to participants, so public officials can monitor balances and yields directly from their desktop. This program should be fully operational during the fourth quarter of 2000.

ASSETS BY PARTICIPANT

Although more municipalities participate in LAMP, school boards continue to have more total assets under management, averaging nearly \$4.5 million per account.

In this area we are also planning to upgrade the entire LAMP web site, www.lamppool.com. Enhancements will provide easier navigation for site visitors and additional information about the program, its benefits to participants and its performance. The web site has become popular among participants since it was launched in 1998, and we intend to make it more useful and more informative for its users.

In another important area, LAMP's data base has been enlarged by some 25%, giving us a larger contact list to market the pool and to tell the LAMP story. Expanding the outreach of the LAMP message will help increase the economy of scale that benefits all LAMP's participants.


We continue to pursue additional avenues to improve the productivity of LAMP operations to benefit our participants. Part of that process is to carefully examine every aspect of LAMP's functions to find more efficient, more effective ways to report, to communicate and to manage the pool.

LAMP represents a unique endeavor among the 59 similar public fund pools across the country in its operation as a cooperative venture among its participants. The staff and officers of LAMP recognize the trust our participants have placed in our hands. We pledge our best efforts to continue to earn that trust every day.

COMPOSITION OF PARTICIPANTS

Municipalities and school boards continue to represent the largest number of participants in LAMP, together comprising more than 40% of the total.

YEAR IN REVIEW

LAMP CONTINUED its six-year record of successful performance during 1999, even in an increasingly challenging interest rate environment. Often, public money pools experience difficulty in staying ahead of rising short-term interest rates. However, during 1999, LAMP's yields once again consistently bettered its benchmarks.

The pool averaged a net yield during the year of 5.06%, a full 48 basis points more than the benchmark IBC/Donahue's Institutional Government Money Market Index. LAMP's average return for the year also exceeded the average 90-day Treasury bill by 32 basis points and the average 60-day Louisiana bank CD index by 51 basis points.

Net assets totaled \$689 million at the end of the year, a 17.6% increase over 1998 year-end figures. During 1999, net assets peaked at more than \$768 million and averaged nearly \$728 million for the full year, nearly 35% more than the average for all of 1998.

Viewed in perspective, the \$103 million increase in year-end assets for 1999 exceeded the total amount of assets under management at the end of the first year of LAMP's operation in 1994.


The number of participants also grew significantly during 1999, reaching 285 by the end of the year, a 35.7% growth rate. School boards continue to represent the largest amount of assets under management, although municipal governments represent the largest number of participants. 
NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS

opinion to LAMP's operations, the sixth consecutive time in the pool's history. As a matter of fact, LAMP has never received any qualifications from the auditor in the pool's existence.

Standard & Poor's once again awarded LAMP a rating of AAAm, the highest designation available to public money market funds. The AAAm rating is defined by S&P as follows: "Safety is excellent. Superior capacity to maintain principal value and limit exposure to loss." The S&P AAAm rating also indicates a superior ability for the pool to maintain a net asset value of \$1 per unit at all times. 
LAMP participated in 17 conferences across the state last year, including: Louisiana Assessors Association, Police Jury Association of Louisiana, Louisiana School Boards

PROGRAM PROFILE

LAMP was created in 1993 as a cooperative endeavor to assist local Louisiana governmental entities in the investment of their cash balances. LAMP's primary objectives include:

PRESERVATION OF PRINCIPAL

The primary goal of the program is to maintain a stable net asset value in the pool so that principal is preserved.

LIQUIDITY

LAMP offers same-day access to funds by a simple call to the toll-free LAMPline at 1-800-272-8162 to make transfers or investments with no transaction fees. Participants may also fax instructions toll-free to LAMP at 1-800-604-6988.

INCREASED YIELD

The combined purchasing power of LAMP generally attracts higher interest rates for LAMP participants.

Municipalities, parish governments, school boards, levee boards, sheriff departments, district attorneys, utility districts, local government units and other political subdivisions are eligible to enroll in the LAMP program and enjoy all the program benefits. By pooling assets and resources local authorities can benefit from the same level of professional money management otherwise available only to larger institutions.

ADMINISTRATIVE EFFICIENCY

LAMP participants have 24-hour access to account information, performance and yields by calling the toll-free LAMPline at 1-800-272-8162.

INTERNET INFORMATION

LAMP's web site, www.lamppool.com, contains information on LAMP's latest rates, participants, upcoming events, board members, staff and officers, as well as links to interesting and informative sites of other Louisiana associations, state agencies and national financial information providers.

PROFESSIONAL MANAGEMENT

LAMP employs a professional administrative staff, contracts with a major Louisiana bank for custodial services and with a separate, nationally known investment manager which follows strict guidelines adopted by the Board of Directors. By the end of 2000, LAMP will also employ independent professional investment counsel.

ARBITRAGE TRACKING

LAMP participants have a professional investment advisor to track earnings on bonds issued and invest those earnings to achieve attractive returns.

LOW COST

By aggregating the funds available for investment, LAMP can reduce the administrative and custodial fees and maximize the yield on participants' investments.

VOTING RIGHTS

LAMP participants maintain direct control of who oversees the management of the investment pool by electing the Board of Directors for LAMP, Inc. at the annual membership meeting.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

Louisiana Asset Management Pool (LAMP) operates under Louisiana law as a cooperative endeavor to assist local Louisiana governmental entities in the investment of cash balances. The objective of LAMP is to provide safety of principal and daily liquidity with a competitive rate of return through investments in obligations issued by the U.S. government, its agencies and instrumentalities and in repurchase agreements collateralized by those investments. All public entities, excluding the State of Louisiana and its departments, are eligible to participate in LAMP.

LAMP is administered by a Louisiana non-profit corporation, Louisiana Asset Management Pool, Incorporated (LAMP, Inc.), which is governed by a board of 15 members elected by the pool's participants each year at the LAMP annual meeting.
